A well-stocked first-aid kit can help you respond effectively to common injuries and emergencies, especially for your employees who spend their work days outdoors. Grounds keepers and utility workers are most susceptible to random scrapes, cuts and insect stings. Store your kits someplace easy to get to and make sure it's well stocked. You may want to tailor your kit based on your activities and needs.
